

Diocesan Work Camp 2014

For the first time, this summer RCS students attended Diocesan Work Camp (DWC). Six of the nine RCS students who attended the camp went with Kris Levy and Lisa Brajdic. The remaining three traveled with the St. Andrew's group. The camp, held June 21-27, was based at Hargrave Military Academy in Chatham, VA, and served the Danville and Pittsylvania County area. Our nine students joined 171 youth from around the diocese for fun, fellowship, and faith building activities.

Campers arrived at camp Saturday evening to acclimate and begin their adventure. Sunday was spent team building as the youth and adults were grouped into thirty teams of six youth and one adult. Monday through Thursday the teams spent the day working on their projects. Friday we celebrated our final day and campers returned home. The camp was much more than work projects which varied from home repairs, building decks and wheelchair ramps, and painting Sacred Heart School in Danville.

Each day began with Mass, and the evening events focused on faith building. Evening programs included praise and worship music, fun activities, photos and testimonies. If you have work camp experience, this sounds like business as usual. So the question is, "What made DWC unique?" What made DWC unique was the presence of priests, seminarians, and Campus Ministers from Virginia colleges and universities. Nine priests and eight seminarians attended camp and were active and engaged in the work projects and evening programs. They were like energizer bunnies; they kept going and going and going. Blake Connell, Class of 2015, a work camp veteran, said that the presence of the seminarians made his work camp experience special. Blake said, "Seeing these young men who have dedicated their lives to God, listening to their life stories and spending time with them, made it all real."

Buchanan names its first ever town manager

A former Bedford County planning chief was recently hired as Buchanan's first ever town manager.

The town council named Mary Zirkle to the post. She joined Roanoke County's planning staff earlier this year after a long stint as the chief planner for Bedford County.

Buchanan Mayor Larry Hall said the town is excited to have its first town manager in more than 200 years of existence.

Hall said twenty-eight people applied for the position. "We narrowed it down to five, then we narrowed it to three and then we narrowed it to Mary. Without a doubt, she was the most qualified," he said, noting her education, experience and enthusiasm set her apart.

Botetourt County Administrator **Kathleen Downs Guzi, Class of 1978**, who worked with Zirkle while they were both employed with Bedford County, said: "Mary is a great planner and loves small towns. She will do great."

Zirkle said that she was not aware Buchanan did not have a town manager until she saw the job announcement and is honored to be its first. "This appointment has exceeded my dream of serving a small town. I hope to meet the expectations of town council and look forward to working with citizens to meet their vision of the town as well," she said. "I see such potential in Buchanan and am very excited to be a part of further realizing the potential."

Zirkle, a native of Roanoke, earned a Bachelor of Science in biology at Mary Washington College and a master's of urban and regional planning at Virginia Tech. She was the chief planner for Bedford County from 2006 to February, when she joined Roanoke County as a "Planner II."

She and her husband have a farm in Bedford County, not far from Vinton, and plan to keep that and to have a house in Buchanan. Her salary in the position is \$50,000.

"Almost every project I have worked on as a planner had an aspect of economic development, which is what the town of Buchanan hopes to continue to focus their efforts on with a town manager," she said.

"I look forward to capitalizing on the wonderful potential of Buchanan by focusing on the assets in downtown, the James River, the community events and the existing businesses that provide strength and stability in the Buchanan economy."

Dina Imbriani Bennett, Class of 1983



A chance meeting in a Roanoke Post Office between Patrick Patterson, RCS Principal, and Dina Imbriani Bennett, Class of 1983, has allowed Dina an opportunity to give back to the school she loves and holds near to her heart. While at RCS, Dina built life-long caring and supportive relationships with mentors and friends who were like family. These people looked after her and provided family life examples, meals, and rides to athletic events. The help Dina received came from the hearts of her mentors and friends who helped because they wanted to. In doing this, they instilled in her the importance of giving to others.

Since graduating from RCS, Dina has worked in the corporate world where she trained and coached sales staff. As a trainer, Dina has been able to help people be better at what they do. When Dina was asked about her impact on others, she said, "I became a mentor because of the mentors I had."

Currently, Dina is the Vice President and Instructor for Mountain Shepherd Wilderness Survival School (MSWSS) in Catawba, VA. Her husband of eight years, Reggie Bennett, is retired from the Air Force, where he was a SERE (Survival, Evasion, Resistance, and Escape) trainer. He is the founder and proprietor of MSWSS. Together Reggie and Dina offer a variety of survival courses to the public, but they also design courses to benefit places such as the Rescue Mission and Bethany Hall: Women in Recovery, as a way of giving back to the community.

This past spring, RCS held its Senior and Junior Retreats at MSWSS. The Senior Retreat focused on survival. The seniors learned the Seven Principles of Surviving in the Wild which include positive mental attitude, wilderness first-aid, shelter-craft, fire-craft, signaling, water procurement, and food procurement. They learned not only how these principles apply to wilderness survival, but also how they apply to everyday life. By incorporating these priorities into your life, you can achieve what you want in life. The Junior Retreat provided a chance to take time out during a challenging academic year to breathe and to reflect.

Not only is MSWSS a beautiful setting for a retreat, it provided our students an opportunity for an experience of a life-time. The beautiful facilities include a lodge and a pond surrounded by wilderness. Dina's and Reggie's leadership is casual, confident, welcoming and encouraging. RCS looks forward to returning to MSWSS in the spring of 2015 for more retreats!

Seven Principles of Surviving in the Wild (in order of importance):

Positive Mental Attitude is the ability to make good decisions and maintain the right mindset. Understanding the physical and mental stresses and how you react and respond to them so the stressors do not overcome vou.

Wilderness First Aid is the ability to make quick and right decisions to solve the right problem, not the perceived problem. It is looking at the whole body, not just a part.

Shelter protects you from the elements (wind, rain, heat, cold) and from things that you cannot control. It is finding a safe spot to decompress or someone to confide in to help you deal with what can harm you.

Fire is life in survival situation. Fire purifies water, provides heat, and scares away animals. You must hold onto your core values to keep passion. People will try to put the fire out, sway you away from your passion. You need to feed your passion; you need to brace it and give it oxygen. Learn to stay true to self and to stay on track.

Signaling is communication. Signals help rescuers rescue you, It is communicating differently based on who you are talking and dealing with. Inclusion is an important signal; when you need help ask for it, so that people can help you.

Water is getting your priorities in line. Not having water in the first 24 hours will not kill you. Purifying and filtering water is important; you can see through something that appears good and get to the bottom of it and it is nasty. Filtering leaves the nasty stuff behind.

Food is making hard choices and getting over food aversions; eating things we mentally do not like to survive. It is doing things we do not want to do, but need to do in order to survive.

Athletics

The 2014-2015 Sports season is off to a great start! We currently have four varsity sports under way during the fall season: volleyball, cross country, football, and cheerleading.

Our varsity volleyball team is currently 17-3, with wins over public schools Franklin County, James River-Midlothian, Rockbridge County, and Eastern Montgomery. They were also recently victorious over rival LCA. Their three losses have come against Salem High School, ranked #2 in the Timesland area, Westover Christian, one of the top Division III teams in the state, and Franklin County. Coach Aaron King has the team working hard and poised to make a run at an unprecedented fourth Division III State Championship in a row.

The cross country team is enjoying a fine season so far. Most recently, they participated at the Allegheny Invitational. Ten RCS runners brought home medals and the boys' middle school team placed 1st in their race! This year's cross country team is one of the largest teams we have had in recent years, with over thirty RCS student-athletes participating (middle school – varsity). Coach April Snow had the team working hard all summer and she expects our team to compete at a high level all season.

The varsity football team is 4-2, and kicked off their 2014 campaign with a convincing win over Rappahannock County High School, winning 34-0. They followed that with two more big wins over Brunswick Academy and Fishburne Military Academy - a school in the much larger Division II category (RCS is in Division IV). So far this year, several players have had stand-out performances for RCS on both the offensive and defensive side of the ball. The team's roster has been bolstered by a handful of new RCS students and to the football program. Coach Bob Price is excited to see how the season will play out and looks to return the Celtics to the state playoffs this year.

The cheerleaders have been practicing all summer and are prepared to have a new look and style. With the hiring of a new coach, RCS teacher Tina Gibson, the addition of tumbling practice sessions throughout the summer, and a larger roster than in previous years, we look forward to hearing them cheer on our sports teams as the year progresses.


