## Required:

#### **1.** *Fallout* - Steve Sheinkin

Secrets, spies, and the Cold War collide in this gripping nonfiction thriller. From hidden bunkers to nuclear near-misses, history has never been this intense.

### 2. <u>The Vanderbeekers of 141st Street</u> – Karina Yan Glaser

Five siblings. One brownstone. Zero time to stop their landlord from kicking them out before Christmas. Can the Vanderbeekers save their home with heart and hustle?

# Choose ONE of the following:

#### 1. The Green Ember - S.D. Smith

A kingdom in peril. Swords raised high. Two brave rabbits fight for hope, loyalty, and a legend whispered in the wind: "My place beside you, my blood for yours."

#### 2. Father Damien and the Bells – Arthur and Elizabeth Sheehan

With laughter, courage, and faith, Fr. Damien brought hope to an island of forgotten souls. Ring the bells and meet the priest who became a saint through love.

### 3. The Adventures of Robin Hood - Roger Lancelyn Green

#### 2. <u>Fault Lines in the Constitution</u> – Cynthia Levinson & Sanford Levinson

#### **1.** *Funny in Farsi* – Firoozeh Dumas

#### **2.** *Inquisitor's Tale* – Adam Gidwitz

#### 3. The Destiny of Sunshine Ranch - T. M. Gaouette

#### **4.** *Call of the Wild* – Jack London

### **2.** <u>The Night Diary</u> – Veera Hiranandani

#### 1. <u>A Man for All Seasons</u> – Robert Bolt
